## 4 Eligibility Requirements

- A developmental disability is a disability which is attributable to mental retardation, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, head injury, autism, or a learning disability related to a brain dysfunction, or any other mental or physical impairment which occurs before the age of 22.
- Likely to continue indefinitely
- Multiple substantial functional limitations
- Lifelong/extended duration
- There are separate eligibility requirements for DD waiver services.
