

ATR IV Grant Update

- Missouri was notified July 19th our ATR4 grant application was not selected for funding
- Six ATR4 grants were funded; Illinois, Iowa, Idaho, Massachusetts, Inter-Tribal Council of Michigan and North Carolina (new)
- Missouri's ATR4 grant application scored 85 points, tied for 6th place with Connecticut and North Carolina
- Tie-breaker process compared the scores of one section of the application.
 - Missouri 25 other applicant 26

Federal Fiscal Year 2015

- FFY15 budget has not yet been approved by the House of Representatives and the Senate.
- If ATR funding is restored to FFY15 then SAMHSA could use the existing ATR 4 grant applications and scoring process to fund the next 5-6 ATR grants, including Missouri.
 - House and Senate could agree on a new FFY15 budget that restores ATR funding
 - House and Senate enacts a continuing resolution that funds FFY15 at the FFY14 levels possibly restoring ATR funding
 - Short term CR might not produce ATR4 awards

Impact

- This is a loss of \$9 million over three years affecting 7500 uninsured adults
- 38 ATR funded recovery support providers employee 408 staff members
- ATR III has funded substance use disorder treatment and recovery services to 17,000 uninsured adults.
- ATR I, II and III brought \$50 million substance use disorder treatment and recovery services funding to Missouri 2004-2014
- 130,000 individuals and families with substance use disorders, who might otherwise have gone without assistance, have received help from ATR grant funds.

Recovery Support Funding

- The ATR grant rules will not allow us to pay for services past September 30, 2014, however we are projecting ATR administrative fund surplus which we plan to use to make performance incentive awards to recovery support providers to help "bridge" the funding gap.
- No permanent state funding available
