FACTS ABOUT CHILD DEVELOPMENT

In the United States, 1 in 6 children aged 3 to 17 has one or more developmental or behavioral health disabilities, such as autism, a learning disorder, or attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder.



DEVELOPMENTAL SCREENING AND MONITORING ARE IMPORTANT

Many children with developmental delays or behavioral concerns are not identified as early as possible and do not receive the help they need to succeed in social and educational settings. Research shows that early intervention can greatly improve a child's development. These services can include a variety of options, depending on the child's specific need, but can include helping a child to talk, walk, move, learn and interact with others.
