1. Improve Community Response to Decriminalize Mental Illness – Seven members of the Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI) Crisis Response Work Group and eight other criminal justice, court, and behavioral health stakeholders from Missouri attended training in Miami, FL to learn how to improve the court and community response to decriminalizing mental illness. The 11th Judicial Circuit Miami-Dade County is a national model on collaborative partnerships with Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) officers for pre-booking and post-booking jail diversion and court partners for jail in-reach programs, misdemeanor jail diversion, assisted outpatient treatment, felony jail diversion, and forensic treatment facility diversion. Attendees toured the new Mental Health and Recovery Center which provides services for crisis stabilization, short-term residential treatment, day treatment, and behavioral health and primary care treatment services. The facility also includes space for the courts and social services agencies such as housing providers, legal services that will address comprehensive needs of individuals served.

2. Missouri Team Presents at the National Council for Mental Wellbeing Conference – The National Council for Mental Wellbeing held its annual conference (NatCon) in Los Angeles, California, May 1-3, 2023. NatCon is the largest healthcare conference within the United States that focuses on mental health and substance use prevention, treatment, and recovery. The conference had over 5,000 attendees, 500 speakers, and 200 exhibitors and sponsors. A presentation by DBH's Andrea Kimball; Missouri Behavioral Health Council's Natalie Cook; and, Ryan Essex from the Gibson Center for Behavioral Change, emphasized the collaborative approach to modernization of substance use programming in Missouri utilizing the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) criteria.

- 4. **Brandon Act Aims to Improve Mental Health Support** The Defense Department policy directs the services to establish policy, assign responsibilities, and provide procedures for service members to request a referral for a mental health evaluation through a commanding officer or supervisor. The process allows service members to seek help confidentially for any reason, at any time, and in any environment, thereby reducing the stigma associated with seeking mental health care.

Implementation of the policy will occur in two phases. In phase one, which should be implemented within 45 days, the services will establish procedures to implement the policy for service members on active duty. FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

- 1. Rural Communities Opioid Response Program Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) announced a new \$9 million funding opportunity for the FY 2023 Rural Communities Opioid Response Program Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health (RCORP-CABH). This program is designed to establish and expand sustainable behavioral health care services for children and adolescents aged 5-17 years who live in rural communities, and to prevent substance misuse. Over the four-year period of performance, award recipients will "...use RCORP-CABH funding to establish and expand service delivery, provide training and peer mentorship, and develop community partnerships." HRSA will offer up to 9 awards of \$1 million each. Application Due Date: Wednesday, May 24, 2023.
- 2. HRSA Funding Opportunity: Screening and Treatment for Maternal Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) recently announced an \$8.75 million funding opportunity for Screening and Treatment for Maternal Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders. This grant program is open to States, Tribes, and Tribal organizations, and aims to "... expand health care providers' capacity to screen, assess, treat, and refer pregnant and postpartum people for maternal mental health and substance use disorders (SUD). This will be accomplished by establishing, improving, and/or maintaining statewide or regional1 networks that provide real-time psychiatric consultation, care coordination support services, and culturally and linguistically appropriate training to maternity care providers and clinical practices." This program will offer up to 14 awards of up to \$750 thousand per award. Application Due Date: Friday, June 2, 2023.
- 3. Strategic Prevention Framework Partnerships for Success for Communities, Local Governments, Universities, Colleges, and Tribes/Tribal Organizations The purpose of this program is to help reduce the onset and progression of substance misuse and its related problems by supporting the development and delivery of community-based substance misuse prevention and mental health promotion services. The program is intended to expand and strengthen the capacity of local community prevention providers to implement evidence-based prevention programs. Application Due Date: Monday, June 5, 2023. - 4. **Request for Proposals-Opioid Crisis** The City of St. Louis Department of Health seeks proposals for activities to address the Opioid crisis in the City of St. Louis by improving access to substance use treatment and recovery, furthering overdose prevention and harm reduction efforts, and providing services for those at high risk for overdose. **Application Due Date:** *Tuesday, June 6, 2023.* Learn More

Minority AIDS Initiative: The Substance Use and Human Immunodeficiency Virus Prevention Navigator Program for Racial/Ethnic Minorities is a \$10.3 million funding opportunity that aims "...to provide substance use and HIV prevention services to racial and ethnic minority populations at high-risk for substance use disorders (SUDs) and HIV infection." - 1. **New** The Eat, Sleep, Console Care Approach for Infants with Neonatal Opioid Withdrawal Syndrome Findings from the Eating, Sleeping and Consoling for Neonatal Opioid Withdrawal (ESC-NOW) study show a new care approach that is more effective than usual care approaches for opioid-exposed infants.

- 3. **New NIH Initiative Expands Access to Resources for Early Psychosis Treatment and Research** The Early Psychosis Intervention Network (EPINET), an NIMH initiative aimed at determining how to best provide treatment for individuals experiencing symptoms of early psychosis, is increasing access to resources for researchers, providers, and families through a growing network of research hubs and a new website. - 4. **New Emergency Drug Overdose Visits Associated with Increased Risk for Later Suicide** A new data analysis has found patients who visited the emergency department for an opioid or sedative/hypnotic drug overdose were at higher risk of dying by drug overdose or suicide in the year after being discharged relative to the general population. - 5. **New Pandemic Era Telehealth Innovations** In their bold response to challenges during the COVID-19 pandemic, providers fostered innovations that have reshaped mental health and substance use treatment service delivery, especially through increased use of telehealth services (telebehavioral health). - 6. **New Using Technology to Help Predict Binge and Purge Episodes in People with Eating Disorders** In binge-eating disorder and bulimia nervosa, people experience recurrent and frequent episodes in which they eat unusually large amounts of food and feel a sense of loss of control. <u>Learn More</u>
- 7. **New Developing Rapid, Accurate Assessment of Mental Disorders, Suicide Risk in Youth** For many adults who have a mental disorder, symptoms were present—but often not recognized or addressed—in childhood and adolescence. Early treatment can help prevent more severe, lasting impairment or disability as a child grows up. Read More
- 8. **New Black, Hispanic Patients Receive MOUD After Opioid-Related Events Less Frequently Than White People** A study by researchers at Harvard University and Dartmouth College shows a discrepancy in the rates in which various populations receive medications for opioid use disorder despite making a similar number of visits to healthcare providers. <u>Learn More</u>

- 9. New DEA Extends Loosened Telehealth Prescribing Rules Until November 11 On Tuesday, May 9, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) announced a temporary extension of COVID-19 telemedicine flexibilities for controlled substances until November 11. In addition, COVID-19 flexibilities will be extended for one year for practitioner-patient relationships established before November 11, 2023.
- 10. New DHSS Health Alert-Xylazine-Involved Fatal Drug Overdoses in Missouri Xylazine is used in veterinary medicine as a sedative and muscle relaxant, but it is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for use in humans. Persons who use xylazine-adulterated opioids are at high-risk for fatal overdose. The White House Office of National Drug Control Policy declared xylazine and the use of fentanyl adulterated or associated with xylazine (FAAX) an emerging threat on April 12, 2023. Missouri DHSS detected a sharp increase in xylazine involved deaths in Missouri from 39 deaths in 2021 to 109 deaths in 2022, a 180% increase. Nearly two thirds (65%) of those deaths occurred in adults between 25 and 44 years of age. For all xylazine-involved deaths in 2019-2022, synthetic opioids were also found in 99.4% of these deaths. Increased surveillance and public education, as well as expanded postmortem testing for xylazine is needed, especially in Missouri jurisdictions with a high prevalence of fentanyl use. Read More

Surgeon General Releases Advisory on Social Connection and Community The U.S. Surgeon General has released an <u>advisory</u> on the public health crisis of loneliness, isolation, and lack of connection in the United States. The report cites recent research showing that approximately half of U.S. adults experienced loneliness daily, even before the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 12. Toolkit: Coordinating Systems of Care to Provide a Comprehensive Behavioral Health Crisis Response to Individuals Experiencing Homelessness This brief suggests strategies to enhance crisis care through multilevel coordination and describes practical approaches that systems of care can deploy to strengthen collaboration. American Psychological Association Panel Issues Recommendations for Adolescent Social Media Use In an effort to provide guidance to educators, parents, policymakers, mental health and health practitioners, technology companies and youths themselves, the APA has released the Adolescence, which contains 10 recommendations.

SAMHSA to Sponsor Equity Challenge to Identify Outreach and Engagement Strategies SAMHSA is sponsoring "The Behavioral Health Equity Challenge: Outreach and Engagement Strategies for Underserved Racial and Ethnic Communities" to identify and highlight outreach and engagement strategies used by community-based organizations (CBOs) to increase access to mental health and substance use prevention and treatment services for racial and ethnic underserved communities.
