Director's Corner

Hello everyone! I had the privilege of meeting with the Missouri DD Health Home providers last week. There are approximately 20,000 active enrollees in DD Health Home currently! I was excited to hear how DD Health Home providers and DDD Staff are working through some of the challenges in engagement with DD Health Home and the wonderful success stories of those who are already enrolled in DD Health Home. I'd like to share with you a couple of highlights from the success stories we talked about in the meeting. An individual had not received dental care in 23 years. A DD Health Home provider identified this

need and connected the individual with a dentist who could provide the care. Another DD Health Home provider made a connection with a local clinic that performs dental and other services. The clinic can provide anesthesia, if necessary. This DD Health Home provider coordinates with an individual's primary care physician or other doctors to determine if the individual requires a blood draw, vaccines, or other procedures that may cause discomfort or anxiety. If permission is given, the local clinic can coordinate these procedures while the individual is under anesthesia to ensure the comfort and safety of the individual. Finally, I was thrilled to hear about the partnerships between DD Health Home providers and Support Coordinators. These partnerships are critical to ensure the best outcomes for individuals. I would encourage all Support Coordinators and DD Health Home providers to actively reach out to one another and build those relationships. The work that you do really goes hand in hand. This is a way to add a valuable resource to your network and better support the individuals we serve. As always, I appreciate everyone's contributions in serving, empowering and supporting Missourians to live their best lives.

State Fire Marshal Inspection Processes for Certified/Accredited Med Waiver Providers

The Office of Licensure and Certification (OLC) will be automating State Fire Marshal (SFM) processes for all certified, including accredited/deemed certified, providers. While this has already occurred for certified providers, accredited/deemed certified providers will no longer need to manually request annual SFM inspections. 2026 Partners in Policymaking Taking Applications Now

Partners in Policymaking (PiP) is a leadership training program available through the Missouri Developmental Disabilities Council (MODDC) that runs from January to September 2026. The PiP program is designed for self-advocates and parents of young children with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD). The goal of PiP is to develop leadership and advocacy skills of the people and families who need and use the I/DD service system. PiP focuses on enhancing partnerships between service users and those in a position to make policies and laws. Participants in the program will have opportunities to meet with national leaders in the DD field, become familiar with various organizations, and connect with opportunities and endless possibilities.

Participants chosen for the program are required to attend all sessions and complete all assignments.

Topics discussed during the sessions include:

- History of Disability Movements
- Quality Education
- Employment
- Housing and Person-Centered Planning
- Positive Behavior Supports
- Parliamentary Procedure: How to Take Control of Meetings
- State/Federal Policy and Legislative Issues
- Assistive Technology
- Community Organizing

DMH's Hearnes Acute Rehabilitation Program (HARP) has been selected as a finalist for the Institute for Inpatient Psychiatric Rehabilitation Award!

Why you should vote for HARP: HARP serves individuals who are dually diagnosed with serious mental illness and intellectual/developmental disabilities and who are in need of psychiatric medication stabilization. This is a 15-bed program at Fulton State Hospital. HARP's goal is to achieve psychiatric rehabilitation within a 90-day stay. HARP utilizes Tools of Choice, Dialectical Behavior Therapy, Behavioral Skills Training, Case Management, and Peer Support to meet individuals on their recovery journey and build upon their strengths. HARP involves the individual in setting goals and developing a treatment plan that addresses the individual's

needs and desires. HARP works closely with guardians, family members, support coordinators, and providers to strengthen care and positive community connections when individuals leave HARP. HARP fosters hope by believing that all individuals have the capacity to succeed.

2025-2026 National Core Indicators and Missouri **Quality Outcomes Surveys: Your Feedback is Important!**

The MO Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) has begun a new survey cycle. DDD participates in three National Core Indicators (NCI) surveys and the Missouri Quality Outcomes Survey. These surveys ask people with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities and their families about their lives and the services they receive.

People receiving DDD services are randomly selected to participate. People selected will be contacted by mail or telephone. Mailed surveys will come from the University of Missouri, Kansas City, Institute for Human Development, later in the year. Telephone contact will be made by staff from the local Regional Office starting in November 2025.

Survey responses are anonymous. DDD reviews and uses the surveys to guide decisions about programs and enhance services. The 2025-2026 survey cycle ends on June 30, 2026. What is ConneXion?

ConneXion is a secure online system that helps providers, support coordinators, and teams share and access important information about individuals receiving Developmental

Goal for ConneXion:

To create a simple, secure system that helps people who support individuals with developmental disabilities share important information—so everyone can work together to provide the best care and services.

What's Happening:

We're planning for the future of ConneXion! Right now, our team is writing a detailed plan—kind of like a shopping list—that explains what we need in a new system to better support individuals and meet state rules.

We hope to share this plan with technology companies in January 2026, so they can show us how they would build it.

What is FHIR?

FHIR (Fast Healthcare Interoperability Resources) is a national standard that helps different computer systems safely share health and support information.



Goal for FHIR:

To make it easier for health care providers, support teams, and service systems to securely share important information, so individuals with developmental disabilities receive better, more connected care.

What's Happening:

Our team is building tools that help different computer systems "talk" to each other using FHIR. This makes it easier for doctors, providers, and support coordinators to share important information—like medical history or support plans.

We are working to share person-centered service plan data in real time through the Health Information Network (HIN) viewer. This will help teams quickly see the most up-to-date information for individuals receiving DD services.

We're aiming to have this ready to go live between January and February 2026.
